WEEKDAY - YEAR 1

First Reading: (Zeph 2:3; 3:12-13).
The prophet holds out hope of salvation
for those who seek God and who
practice integrity and humility.

Responsorial Psalm:
Blessed are the poor in spirit; the
kingdom of heaven is theirs!

Second Reading: (1 Cor 1:26-31).
God chooses the poor, the weak and the
lovely people who are conscious of their
limitations and who therefore rely on
God rather than on themselves.

Gospel: (Mt 5:1-12).
We see the values Christ preached and
lived – values he wishes to see in his
followers.



BEATITUDES: “THE IDENTITY CARD OF CHRISTIANS”

Zephaniah 2:3-13; Psalm 146.6 - 10; 1Corinthians 1:26-31; Matthew 5:1-12

The Sermon on the Mount is the summary and essence of Christ’s teachings. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* presents it as “the heart of Christ’s teaching.” The Eight Beatitudes - "the poor in spirit, those mourn, the meek, the hunger and thirst for righteousness, the merciful, the pure in heart, the peacemakers, the persecuted, the despised and accused for the sake of righteousness (Mt.5.3-10) - is the manifesto of Christ for the whole humanity to follow and enter the Kingdom of God. These are the core values Jesus of Nazareth preached and lived and wished to see in his followers.

What is our understanding of the first beatitude - poor in spirit? All the eight beatitudes are included in it. For Jesus, the ‘poor in spirit’ is one who puts his/her trust in God alone and not in his/her wealth, or other human standards of living. In this sense, there has been only one person who has been perfectly poor. It is Jesus of Nazareth. He was so, not because he lacked the necessities of life, but because during his life on earth he put all his trust in his Father, was obedient and humble even unto death on the cross.

Everybody, whether they sense it or not, is powerless and helpless and unclean and unworthy before God. In this sense, objectively speaking, everybody is poor in spirit. The ‘poor in the spirit’ is the one who is conscious of his/her weakness, limitations and sinfulness and badly feels the need for God’s forgiving love and grace. The tax collector who standing in the temple before God and beating on his breast saying, “God, be merciful to me, the sinner” is a perfect example for the “poor in spirit” (Luke 18:9-14).

As Pope Francis commented (*Wednesday, 29 January 2020*) “The Beatitudes provide the identity card of Christians. It is our identity card because they outline the face of Jesus himself, his style of living...His message to his disciples. It is a message for all of humanity to be poor, to be meek, to be merciful... and share the blessedness of his Kingdom.

The beatitudes challenge us to live our lives by following the eight values engraved in the “manifesto of Christ” - love, meekness, mercy, perseverance, humility, purity of heart and mind. Hundreds of years earlier, the Psalmist prayed, “This poor man called, and the Lord heard him, and saved him from all his distress” (Ps 34:6). We, the ‘poor in spirit’, shall listen to the Lord speaking ‘blessed are you, for I will be with you, I will help you, I will strengthen you, I will uphold you always and I promise that yours is the kingdom of God as he announced it to the repentant and humble thief “ Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise" (Luke 23:43).

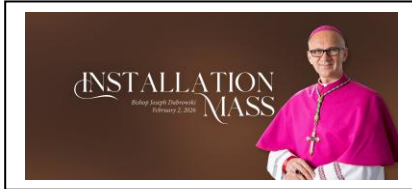
